





MEET ALLY FLORENCE CLUB MEMBER

Prior to becoming a member at the Howard L. Hawks Florence Club, Ally was shy and timid. Club members like Ally are a great example of how important Club programs are to youth, and how critical our staff are in building healthy and trusting relationships.

Like many other young kids, Ally found reading to be a challenging subject and would often become emotional during Readers to Leaders programming. Readers to Leaders is a literacy program at Boys & Girls Clubs of the Midlands that provides a performance boost in reading year round for members. The program teaches important reading skills necessary to connect with and understand



text. Staff member, Ms. Promise, shared that, "Ally was a bit intimidated by Readers to Leaders [at first]. But, with a little motivation, she has started excelling." After a lot of hard work, Ally continues to reach her weekly Readers to Leaders goals!

Ally has grown from a shy new member to an ambitious Club member who is now comfortable asking for help when needed. Ally shared, "I enjoy Boys & Girls Club because I have fun doing art projects such as mask and bracelet making. I like Ms. Promise - she is nice and makes me laugh." The relationship between Ally and Ms. Promise goes both ways as Ms. Promise says, "Ally is a pleasure to work with. She has a great sense of humor and is friendly to everyone."

Readers to Leaders is a robust literacy program for Club members of all ages that leverages a combination of classroom sessions and adaptive assessment tools to encourage reading at or above grade level.

MATH MATTERS

Math Matters breaks down basic math skills such as addition, subtraction, fractions, problem solving, multiplication and division in a fun and interactive way.





POWER HOUR

Power Hour offers a structured time and place for Club staff to help members with an important aspect of the educational process: homework.

STEM

Science, technology, engineering and math programming provides unique activities to advance STEM knowledge and increase interest in STEM-related careers.



ART

Art programming encourages artistic expression among Club members through a range of mediums such as drawing, painting, printmaking, collage and mixed media.

Keystone Club is a premier leadership experience where teen Club members ages 14 to 18 participate in activities that champion academic achievement, career preparation and community service.






TORCH CLUB

I reached for the doors at the Millard Boys & Girls Club, biting my nails and swaying with the breeze. But as soon as I made it past the entrance, I was greeted by some of the most kind-hearted people I have ever met. Staff could sense my emotions and they did everything they could to make sure I felt comfortable.



At the beginning of my Club experience, I sat in the office a lot, confused about who I truly was. It was hard for me to meet new people but at the Club, I was always surrounded by new people. As I got more comfortable with them, I could eventually feel some of the puzzle pieces being set into place for who I was.




