



MEET DEMARCUS NORTH OMAHA CLUB MEMBER

DeMarcus is seven and has been a North Omaha Club member for a year and half. He is an outgoing member, who attends the Club every day of the week. North Omaha Club Director, Dave Felici shared, "DeMarcus has always gravitated towards sports - especially basketball. He's very athletic."

The Math Matters program started in the summer of 2021. DeMarcus was hesitant to participate. He displayed disruptive behavior and was reluctant to join in on math activities. He was struggling with basic math concepts.

But DeMarcus continued to participate in the program, thanks to caring staff like Ms. J and Ms. Tinnes who make it fun and interactive. DeMarcus is able to participate in hands-on math activities to keep him engaged with learning. He also receives one-on-one attention, which DeMarcus loves. As soon as DeMarcus arrives at the Club each day, he immediately heads to the Education Center to participate in Math Matters.

Today DeMarcus has more confidence, and is super excited to play math games. He has shown growth on his assessments, and is continuing to grow each day. Math Matters Director, Allison Tinnes, shared "DeMarcus is full of energy and is always willing to participate. He loves his time with Math Matters."

In response to the COVID learning slide, the Clubs created Math Matters that is as robust as the Clubs' Readers to Leaders program. The Math Matters program utilizes the Freckle and STAR Math online software. The software makes tracking and reporting the members' progress easy. Club staff administer an initial assessment of the members' math skill levels for placement purposes. The Clubs utilize a strength-based approach to learning that engages youth in math, reading and STEM while having fun rather than focusing on Club members' deficits.

As a child, I remember helping my mother translate legal documents. I understood in English what the words meant but couldn't translate them into Spanish. My mom would then say, "Haven't they taught you these words?" I felt useless after not being able to help. But then again what could a seven-year-old do? Especially one who was still adjusting to being bilingual. I then realized my mother was just as stressed as I was about our language barrier. We were both at a loss for communication. Memories like this remind me how common these experiences are. That's a problem I've seen with many bilingual members at the Boys & Girls Club.



When I first joined the Club, my sister Jailene was the office manager. She was the one who encouraged my involvement. I was reluctant to join the Club because all I could hear was the voice in my head saying, "you won't fit in," "what if the kids don't like you?" My sister always told me to be comfortable with being uncomfortable, and I decided it was time to take that advice. Not only did I fit in, I flourished.


When I joined the Club three years ago, I was still hesitant to fully participate but ended up taking part in an essay contest, which required us to discuss our career plans. That moment completely changed my thinking. The participants spoke so eloquently about their plans for college. They looked ambitious and ready to take on the world. It made me think "how can I be like them?" It bothered me that I couldn't plan my future. With the help of the Club, I now know my plan.

I will major in Foreign Languages and Literature. I want to teach communities that need help breaking down the language barrier that affects us all. As a daughter of two immigrant parents, I know firsthand what it's like to feel like an outcast simply because you cannot speak like the majority. I want to give back to my community in the way I know best, through communication.

Luckily for me, the first domino has fallen at the Boys & Girls Club. I have support in every direction. The Bryan Club staff and the scholarship team always pulls through. They are the attraction to success I know is already mine. I now know I can say, Boys & Girls Club makes me feel successful. ... I finally feel successful . . . I AM successful.

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
